

Great little booklet for people thinking about adopting an adult dog. McConnell explains how to prepare for your adult dog's arrival, how to help her settle in, how to build a relationship with her, and more. She also briefly addresses some common problems: housetraining, chewing, separation anxiety, etc. The best part of the book is the bibliography at the end, arranged by subject such as "Crate Training," "Barking," "Fearful Dogs," "General Training," etc. McConnell's booklet is brief and introductory; those expecting an in-depth discussion on training and behavior will be disappointed. The booklet should be treated more like a map; it will orient readers and set them off in the right direction. Once readers understand where they'd like go, they can use the resources in the back to find their way. (What a fabulous, up-to-date bibliography!)

Drs. London & McConnell have written the book that anyone, whether adopting their first or fifth dog, should read. Pet owners and trainers alike will find something to add to their tool box in this book. It should be included with every dog, puppy or older, going to their new home. Shelters and rescue groups will find it to be an invaluable resource for their adopters. Better buy two books since it won't last long on your own bookshelf. Most of Patricia McConnell's books are short and to the point. Great books for getting some concise info to get you started. In this case, the focus is on bringing home a dog who is past puppyhood, and getting you through that initial period of bringing the dog home and getting settled in. Highly recommended if you are new to this or are bringing in a dog that might have more issues than you are accustomed to.
